



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PERSONNEL and EQUIPMENT

STAFF

The calendar year 2011 was one of great turnover for the police department with the retirement of Detective Robert King and Officer Steve Poshedly as well as the resignation of Officer Joel West. The loss of these officers resulted in over 50 years of law enforcement experience leaving our agency.

Their replacement as well as the replacement of Officer Fred Koning, who left in December of 2010 was paramount to our effectiveness. Fortunately Officer Frazer was available to return and quickly replaced Officer Koning. An extensive hiring process late in 2011 resulted in the hiring of two replacement officers for Detective King and Officer Poshedly.

Officer Justin Bahm and Officer Bradley Hagman were hired in October of 2011 and immediately placed in our Field Training Program.



This will be accomplished quickly as we now use "on-line" testing (at no cost) and structure oral interviews internally.

PERSONNEL and EQUIPMENT

CLERICAL


Our single clerical position doubles as the department receptionist. This position not only greets and serves the public, but handles administrative communications, reports and data entries, filing, transcription, and a host of other clerical and secretarial duties. Debbie Kruger has been with the department for a number of years starting in a part time position and moving to full time early in 2007. She is a very conscientious and valued employee to the department. Recently we have engaged Kathy Adair on a fill-in basis to cover Debbie's leave time. Kathy has experience with our department from several years ago and has only recently become available. This arrangement allows the reception area to remain open to the public to a much greater extent.



TRAINING

In 2011 the Charlotte Police Department averaged more than 930 hours of In-Service training. This is approximately the same as last years total, however far below our regular average. This was primarily, due to staffing shortages which impact scheduling and the continuing lack of training opportunities. Some of our training included:

- Firearms, Registration, Extreme Pistol Course, Tactical Shotgun, Rifle Qualifications (annual training)
- Evidence Technicians, Accident Investigation and Reconstruction (MATAI)
- Interview and Interrogation
- PPCT Defensive Tactics
- Grade Crossing and Collision Investigations
- Patrol Techniques, Traffic Enforcement, Criminal Interdiction
- Refresher ASER Training (Active Shooter Response)
- Taser Policy and Use
- Standardized Field Sobriety Testing Methods



We also are very fortunate to have several “in-house” experts who can train personnel in areas of Radar and Laser Speed Enforcement, Preliminary Breath Testing, Handcuffing and Self Defense, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement, Taser Certification, and Firearms.

PERSONNEL and EQUIPMENT

EQUIPMENT

All Law Enforcement Agencies depend on quality equipment in order to be efficient, train productively, and serve their communities well. Charlotte is no different. Each year new and innovative technologies and equipment become available which enhance the productivity and safety of police agencies.

In 2011 the department did not purchase a great deal of equipment due to a conservative budget, however we did add side warning lights for all our emergency vehicles. These lights are located on the front side of the patrol vehicles and allow for increased visibility when entering an intersection.



Federal Law requires that all emergency responding agencies revert to a "Narrow Band" radio frequency by 2013. Eaton Central Dispatch converted to this band in September of 2011. This change required this department to replace seven radios that operate within City Hall. This change has allowed for better reception when officers are in the building and also allows officers to respond to Dispatch with much better reception than before. Two of these receivers were placed in the basement police evidence room as well as our instruction room.



The department also purchased eight Airsoft Smith and Wesson .40 caliber Semi-Auto pistols for training. These devices allow officers to shoot "Soft BB's" for a more realistic training scenario, such as high risk entries, and officer safety situations.



A number of "training pads" were purchased for our ever increasing "in-service" training sessions. These assist in less-lethal training with impact devices, and our Pressure Point Tactic training.



To assist our property room operation and improve our storage capabilities, we purchased 300 storage bins. These greatly enhance our utilization of the property and evidence as well as assisting our property room officers in locating items in our inventory.





PROCEDURES

Constant change is quite normal when it comes to the legal system and the department must adapt to those changes on a regular basis. New laws and statutes require not only changes in procedure, but training in their implementation. One such process is the Standardized Field Sobriety Testing requirements now in practice when investigating Drunk Driving violations. This Standard is now required for prosecution and requires officers to become certified in its application. The Training is extensive and requires over 30 hours of instruction. To circumvent this cumbersome training schedule we have trained an instructor in the department who will then qualify our staff. The instructor will also be able to re-certify the entire staff annually at a fraction of the time and cost.



Another time and cost savings initiative we began in 2011 is the partnership with the Eaton County Prosecutors office to handle certain misdemeanor cases previously handled by our City Attorney. These cases are, for the most part, straight forward Alcohol, Drug, and juvenile offenses. The fines and court cost associated with these offenses will then be collected by the Prosecutor as his compensation. As these funds are normally much lower than paid to our City Attorney, the savings could be substantial. The process was implemented mid year and remains under evaluation. One concern is naturally the accountability we expect in the prosecution of these offenses which will be a factor in determining the longevity of the program.



Currently, we are assessing our responsibilities in regard to hazardous site cleanup. The potential for dangerous drug laboratories as it relates to methamphetamine manufacturing has grown and become challenging to all public safety in recent times. We now have procedures in place to deal with this issue.

With each alteration in procedure comes a corresponding change in the departments General Orders. These Orders are the policy and procedures for the department which remain under constant update and revision.

OPERATIONS

ENFORCEMENT

Investigations: For the year 2011, Det Beal handled 203 investigations. This is the most investigations ever handled by a single detective in the history of the Charlotte Police Department, and the third most investigations ever handled by the entire Detective Bureau, which up until 2010, had been manned by two detectives.

The most prominent crime investigated in 2011 was the same crime that tops the list every year, sex crimes. Next were larceny investigations, followed by fraud complaints. During the course of the year, Detective Beal was called out to nine death scenes and one suicide scene.

Throughout the year, there are always some cases that deserve a little more attention than the others. Here are just a few of those cases:

In January, a woman had her car window broken out and her check book and identification had been taken from her purse that had been laying in plain view. The perpetrators then utilized a woman that matched the victim's description to cash some of the checks from a bank branch in Lansing. Fortunately, the victim had already contacted her bank and advised them of the theft. The suspect temporarily got away before police could arrive. The identity of this woman was ultimately learned and she was charged with federal crimes. It was discovered that this woman was a part of a group that originated in Florida and has travelled the country committing similar acts. This group is known country wide as the "Felony Lane Gang" and arrests across the country are now taking place on a regular basis.

Again in January, a local man was accused of not only providing alcohol and drugs to children, but was also accused of molesting his step-daughter and several other girls that frequented his home. As a result of this investigation, this man fled the state, and he and his wife abandoned their three children. This subject did return to Michigan in September 2011, and was arrested on charges stemming from this investigation. Currently this subject's children have been removed from his and his wife's care and they are in the process of having their parental rights terminated.

The following month, this same local man and his wife were investigated for emptying his mother-in-laws bank accounts and using her money without her authority. The victim claims to be out tens of thousands of dollars as a result of these actions. Both husband and wife have been charged and are awaiting court dates.

ENFORCEMENT Con't

Later in January, Det Beal took over two cases started by Det King involving a local doctor being sexually inappropriate with some of his female patients. As the year progressed, Det Beal discovered 10 more victims of this same doctor. Several warrants were authorized by the prosecutor's office in December 2011, at which point this doctor was arrested. Currently, his medical license has been temporarily suspended by the Attorney Generals Office and it is expected that more cases against this doctor will surface during 2012.

In February, a woman was discovered deceased in her vehicle in the Meijer parking lot. This incident captured the attention of the local media simply because it had been discovered that she had gone unnoticed for two days.

During the second week of February, a registered sex offender was reported to be standing in his window and masturbating while watching middle school aged girls at the bus stop just outside his apartment. Initially, this subject denied committing any inappropriate acts, but ultimately admitted to this and other acts. This subject was still on parole at the time this act was committed and he was sent back to prison on a parole violation. This man has also pleaded guilty to the crime and will be spending several more years behind bars.

At the end of February, the prosecutor's office authorized a warrant on a man that was secretly video taping his niece and great niece while they bathed in his bathroom. This subject has pleaded guilty to eavesdropping and possessing child pornography.

During the months of March and April, Detective Beal took part in "Operation Verify" and conducted house checks on every sex offender residing in the city. This is an especially important operation for the department as the community has challenges in this area.

In March, Michigan Works was broken in to. The suspect had not only stolen several items, but had also damaged a large amount of property within the building. The identity of the suspect was discovered when the subjects stepfather had discovered items belonging to Michigan Works in his stepson's bedroom. The suspect avoided the police for several months until a search warrant was executed on him for his DNA as a result of some blood that had been left behind at the crime scene. The suspect has admitted to the crime however the case is still under review at the prosecutor's office.

ENFORCEMENT Con't

Again in March, a man was investigated for molesting his girlfriend's daughter from a couple of years earlier. As a result of this investigation, it was discovered that this same man had molested two other girls from a previous girlfriend a few years before this incident. This subject is currently in jail awaiting trial.

In April, a man was arrested for Criminal Sexual Conduct committed back in 2001 against his sister in-law. The case had been originally mishandled in 2001 and the victim did not come forward again until December of 2010. As a result of the victim coming forward, Detective Beal was able to follow up with witnesses from the past and was able to create a strong enough case to justify the prosecutor to file charges. This subject ultimately pled guilty to CSC and is now a registered sex offender.

In July, a registered sex offender was investigated for inappropriate sexual behavior with his half sisters. This sex offender confessed to his actions and was arrested. This subject has to register as a sex offender as a result of having sexually assaulted one of the same half sisters, years earlier.

In August, two brothers were accused of taking advantage of young girls that they would meet at Oak Park. These brothers would provide alcohol to these girls and engage in sexual relations with them. Currently, the prosecutor is still reviewing these cases.

In October, a report of an armed robbery to a pedestrian was reported, having occurred at S. Sheldon and W. Shaw St. As a result of the investigation, it was determined that there was no robbery and that there was no evidence of any weapon being displayed.

In December, a report was filed claiming that a woman was walking along E. Shepherd St. and was forced in to a vehicle where a sexual assault occurred in the vehicle, in the Super 8 Hotel parking lot. Several pieces of evidence have been collected and are being processed at the MSP Crime Lab. This incident is still under investigation.

TRAFFIC

During the majority of 2011 the department focus was primarily on commercial vehicle traffic enforcement along our major truck routes and state highways. For many years there has been a community perception that this type of traffic is problematic. With a consistent focus in this area we are able to address many of these concerns. While the enforcement effort has been extensive, the outcome has been less than desired. Violations among this segment of traffic volume is much lower than other forms of transportation and has resulted in detection of far fewer citable offenses.

The assistance of the State of Michigan Motor Carrier program and our own officer training in commercial vehicle enforcement has been of assistance and we plan to continue building on this concept.

Residential traffic enforcement efforts remain and we have succeeded in gaining very high percentages of compliance in a number of areas. Constant diligence is essential in this area as motorists have a tendency to revert to old habits if not monitored.

EATON COUNTY FAIR

Since 2003 our department has handled security for the County Fair held in Charlotte each summer. Officers are assigned shifts and are physically present in and around the fairgrounds the entire week of the Fair.

Officer presence provides a great deal of security and comfort to the patrons at the event and has been very well received by the Fair Board.



CELEBRATE CHARLOTTE/FRONTIER DAYS

Other community events such as Celebrate Charlotte and the ever popular Frontier Days have seen a strong police presence for a number of years. Officers work hundreds of hours during each festival with the greatest presence at the Car Show during Celebrate Charlotte and the Saloon and Parade during Frontier Days.



Planning for these events includes a number of staff meetings, logistic sessions and correspondence with the boards and directors of the various events. Our working relationship with these boards as well as the Chamber of Commerce has produced some very successful and safe events for our community.

SPECIAL VICTIMS UNIT

The Special Victim's Unit is currently comprised of three team members. Det. James Beal, Officer Paul Montague, and Officer Rich Frazer. Over the course of 2011, the team lost two team members. Det. Robert King, (retirement), and Officer Joel West, (KDPS).

Even though the SVU lost 2/5's of its members in 2011, the case load, compared to last years numbers, has more then doubled. For 2011, the SVU investigated 168 incidents. This would average out to almost one new case every two to three days.

The majority of the team's investigations involved Sex Offender issues. Currently, there are 52 registered sex offenders residing in the city limits of Charlotte. Of those 52, eleven are incarcerated, leaving 41 sex offenders living within the community. Of the 168 incidents investigated by the SVU, 116 cases involved registered sex offenders. These cases involved, random house checks (42), offenders coming in to verify (39), offenders coming in to update information (21), Registration violations (12), and sex offenders coming in to pay their SOR Fee (2).

The next most common investigation involved Criminal Sexual Conduct cases. During 2011, the Special Victims Unit investigated a total of 39 CSC's. The case that seems to be attracting the most media attention involves a local doctor who was recently charged with three counts of CSC. Since he was charged, there have been several others that have come forward to file complaints, and it is expected that more cases involving this doctor shall continue to come in during 2012. Currently, the physicians license has been suspended by the Attorney Generals Office.

The remaining investigations involved cases of child abuse, embezzlement from a vulnerable adult, indecent exposure, sex offense, suspicious situations, assisting other agencies, and child neglect.

The following is a breakdown of each team member's case activity. Totals may vary from the number of incidents investigated from the number of cases worked by team members due to more then one team member working certain cases.

COMMAND

The Charlotte Police Department Command Staff are a highly trained and dedicated group of officers who oversee the officers on their various shifts, review reports and other paperwork, lead special teams and duties, maintain equipment, assist with training and policy development, all while patrolling, answering citizen complaints, and working traffic.



Sgt. Dan Schneider is the most senior Sergeant and as such handles some scheduling duties, crime prevention activities, oversees our Property Room and some records management.

Sgt. Lisa Sherman is charged with vehicle maintenance and LEIN supervision. Sgt. Sherman also works with our warrant files and is in charge of our Accident Investigators as well as our Field Training Unit.



Sgt. Curt Bristol is our Firearms instructor/trainer and Range Officer. Curt works the night shift and has recently taken over the vehicle maintenance duties.

As a former DARE Instructor, Sgt. Bristol is an important liaison with the School District as well as a resource for our communities youth.



Sgt. James Falk is our main statistical officer and is responsible for a great deal of data presented to the community each month and year. Sgt. Falk is also a firearms instructor and a certified Commercial Vehicle enforcement officer.

Each command officer has a number of other responsibilities in addition to those listed above. These officers work diligently in all areas in a highly collaborative manner to insure the smooth operation of the Department.

ACCIDENT INVESTIGATION TEAM

The Charlotte Police Departments Accident Investigation Team is a group of highly trained officers who have special certifications within the Traffic Crash Investigation and Reconstruction realm.

Their specialty goes beyond the actual traffic accident investigation. Each officer has a unique perspective on traffic safety issues and can often recognize hazards before they become problematic.

As indicated in 2011, a concentration on commercial vehicles dominated the training and provided a fortunate and timely addition to our teams already impressive credentials. Fortunately, we experience very little in the area of serious commercial vehicle crashes.

EVIDENCE / PROPERTY TEAM

Property and Evidence are of critical importance to the operation of any Law Enforcement Agency and here at the Charlotte Police Department we have highly trained and very skilled personnel able to process any crime scene, from a minor larceny to a detailed homicide. The team has been trained to work in conjunction with the Michigan State Police Laboratory and has a sterling reputation at that level.

Sgt. Schneider and Officer Poortvliet are also in charge of our property room and as such arrange for the recording and storage of evidence collected at these various crime scenes as well as property recovered as the result of other investigations.

SCHOOL LIAISON

One challenge has been in scheduling his time at the district effectively. The department has often required his presence on general road patrol and this has lead to diminished service to the school. YEAR END STATISTICS

STATISTICAL DATA

The Charlotte Police Department collects a multitude of statistical data and attempts to formulate our enforcement efforts to address any areas identified as concerns within this data matrix. This is easier said than done as we acknowledge that there are a number of mitigating factors that have an impact on our statistics.

Community activities, development, construction, promotional events, and even the weather have a good deal to do with the number and types of work law enforcement must address.

Sergeant James Falk reviews monthly and yearly statistics and constantly checks and verifies our numbers. In this way we strive for accuracy and accountability. This data is then compared to county and state data submitted in a process of checks and balances. With this system we believe we achieve the greatest accuracy.

The following pages account for this time consuming effort and is our very best account of the work completed by the Charlotte Police in 2011. Please remember that each of the numbers represented here reflects incidents of varying intensity as well as difference in consumption of resources. A simple larceny may take a single day to solve, while another similar incident may take months or even all year to complete.



■ COMPARISON OF TOTAL CRIMES



■ COMPARISON OF TOTAL ARRESTS










Part I Crime Patterns





(Including Hit & Run Accidents)




