NOVEMBER 8TH GENERAL ELECTION

On November 8, 2022 the state-wide General Election will be held. Polls will be open from 7am to 8pm for in-person voting. Precinct locations and other election information can be found here:

Need to register? Beginning October 25th through November 8th at 8 p.m. you must register in person with proof of residency. Regular business hours are Monday through Friday, 9am to 4pm (closed for lunch from 1p-2p). You may register in-person on Election Day during poll hours.

Want to vote Absentee? You must first submit an application. Ballots will continue to be mailed as applications are received until Friday, November 4th. The Clerk's office will be open Saturday November 5th from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. to issue absentee ballots only. Please note: no other business will be offered during this dedicated time. The last opportunity to obtain an absentee ballot is by visiting the Clerk's office on Monday, November 7th before 4:00 p.m. and the ballot MUST be voted on site if requested that day.

All voted ballots must be <u>received</u> by the Clerk before 8:00 p.m. election day November 8, 2022. Ballots can be returned by mail, or City Hall Utility/Ballot drop off box, or to the Clerk's Office at City Hall during regular business hours. (cont. page 3)

(VOTING cont'd from page 1) If you make a mistake on your ballot, bring your ballot to the clerk's office to be spoiled and issued a new ballot. Before sending your ballot, please make sure you sign the outside of your purple envelope; your ballot cannot be accepted without your signature.



Residents in the city of Charlotte will see a question on the back of the ballot as to whether the charter should be amended to change the term of mayor from two years to four years, starting in November 2023. City Council voted to put the question to the voters. If adopted, this would make all elected offices in the city four-year terms. It is important to note that this would NOT affect the current mayor's term or any council member term length.

Ballot Language:

Subsection (B) of Section 13.1 of the City Charter provides for the election of the mayor in November of each odd-numbered year for a two-year term. It is proposed that subsection (B) be amended to provide that commencing with the election in November, 2023, the mayor shall be elected for a 4-year term. Shall the proposed amendment be adopted?

Blight, Weeds, or Junk Vehicles Properties must be kept in good repair, including exterior siding and roofs, and free of junk/debris. Additionally, city code states that vehicles must be registered and operable. Grass and vegetation be maintained so as not to exceed 10 inches in height. A code enforcement inspector will take action on properties that are not maintained. They may also have weeds/grass cut at the property owner's expense. Please keep shrubs and trees trimmed back at corners to prevent traffic hazards, and away from sidewalks for pedestrian safety.

Downtown Residents—Reminder: parking permits expire at the end of October. Please make sure to complete an application online at www.charlottemi.org.to get your updated 6m permit (November through April). Please call 517-543-1552 with any questions on parking permits.



Fall Leaf Collection Curbside collection of bagged leaves will take place on the following dates:



- Monday, October 17th to Thursday, October 20th
- Monday, October 31st to Thursday, November 3rd
- Monday, November 21st to Wednesday, November 23rd

Bags must be placed curbside, no plastic please. Please, leaves only. Brush will <u>not</u> be collected curbside but may be taken to drop-off site.

Please note: Saturday, Nov 5th is final weekend for Saturday DPW garage drop-off hours until spring. Winter drop-off hours are 8a to 4p, Monday through Friday.

This fall as you are preparing to clean up your lawn, please do <u>NOT</u> rake leaves or other debris into storm drains. Nothing but rain water should flow from your yard into storm drains. Lawn clippings, leaves and other debris often clump, which can contribute to a larger problem underground in the city-wide storm system.



Lead Service Line Replacement. A survey of the city's water system is needed to comply with the



amended Michigan Safe Drinking Water Act which was changed in 2018 to require all municipal drinking water providers to inventory their water lines by 2025.

Part of that work includes verifying the material of the water service inside the residence. Water service lines can be copper or plastic, but some may be galvanized steel, iron, or lead.

While Charlotte has begun work on the outside portion of the project, a concerted effort will be undertaken soon to verify service material inside a home. If you would like to schedule an appointment for a city employee to verify your service, please call 517-543-8858.

A \$350,700 grant to assist in the effort to identify lead service leads has been obtained from EGLE. This work is mandated by the state, and more information about lead service lines can be found here: Michigan.gov lead and copper rule.

Rave Alerts. The City of Charlotte is using Rave alerts! Get notified with important information about what is happening in the community such as street closures, water system work, or emergencies that may affect you. There are several ways to register: Text CHARLOTTE to 67283; Download the Smart911 app; or Register for a free and secure safety profile online at Smart911.com.

The City also sends out notifications specific to users by address, such as notices when quarterly utility bills are sent out. If you're already registered, make sure to update your profile address so you're receiving accurate information.

Michiganders in crisis now have an easy-to-remember three-digit number to call for help – 988. Michigan has joined the nation in <u>transitioning to the 988-dialing code</u>, which will operate through the existing National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's network of more than 200 locally operated and funded crisis centers across the country.

In 2020, Congress designated the new 988 dialing code to operate through the <u>National Suicide Prevention Lifeline</u> This action expands the existing Lifeline beyond people who are feeling sui-

cidal to all individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis, including suicidal thoughts or substance abuse issues. Trained counselors will be available 24/7 to field calls. They will listen to the caller's problems, assess their needs and provide support by connecting them with resources, and alert local emergency crisis teams, if necessary.

Anyone with these concerns can call:

- Mental health-related distress.
- Thoughts of suicide.
- Substance use crisis.
- Emotional distress.
- There are specialized services available for veterans, LGBTQ individuals and other groups.
- People who are worried about a loved one who may need support also can call.

The 988-dialing code does not replace the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (800-273-TALK (8255)) or other locally operated crisis lines. Instead, it serves as a universal entry point to connect individuals in need to trained crisis counselors who can help. MDHHS is working to ensure a solid infrastructure is built through coordination with 911 and other crisis service providers as the 988-dialing code launches.


Prior to the development of 988, the Michigan Crisis and Access Line (MiCAL) was funded by the Michigan Legislature in December 2018. MDHHS was charged with the development of MiCAL, which is currently operating in Oakland County and the Upper Peninsula, and with 988 implementation.

MiCAL is built on the SAMHSA's National Guidelines for Behavioral Health Crisis Care which is also the foundation for 988. In Michigan, MiCAL is responsible for answering 988 calls in all areas of Michigan. In Macomb and Kent counties, Macomb County Community Mental Health and Network 180 will answer 988 calls with MiCAL providing back-up call coverage.

The Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is a federal program run by the FCC to assist qualifying low-income households pay for internet service and connected devices such as laptops or tablets. Households may be eligible if their income is below 200% the Federal Poverty Line or if someone in the household receives a government benefit such as SNAP, Medicaid, SSI, WIC, Pell Grant, or Free and Reduced-Proce Lunch.

If eligible, households may receive up to a \$30/month discount on internet service, up to \$75 a month discount on qualifying Tribal lands, and a one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, tablet, or desktop computer (with a co-payment of more than \$10 but less than \$50).


Michigan Homeowner Assistance Fund (MIHAF). The Fund was established under section 3206 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (the ARP) to mitigate hardships associated with the coronavirus pandemic by providing funds to prevent homeowner mortgage delinquencies, defaults, foreclosure, loss of utilities or home energy services and displacements of homeowners experiencing financial hardship on or after January 21, 2020 or for those homeowners who experience a coronavirus pandemic financial hardship that began before January 21, 2020 but continued after that date. Emergency Home Repair Program. Eaton County administers an Emergency Repair Program. No interest, no payment loans to Eaton County residents who meet federal, state and County Housing Program guidelines may be provided. This program assists with emergency repairs that are causing a health and safety risk to the occupants and the structure of the home.

The program offers up to \$20,000 in no interest, no payment loan assistance to repair and improve program participant's home. A deferred mortgage is recorded against the property for the amount invested into the home. 


