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Mission Statement

The Charlotte Volunteer Fire Department shall provide the best possible emergency services in order to protect the lives and property of citizens of the City of Charlotte and the Rural Fire Association by utilizing state of the art equipment and techniques, and by continuous improvement through training and education.











Department History

- October 8th 1872, exactly one year after the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, the Charlotte Fire Department was officially organized. The department had 36 members and was known as Charlotte Hose Company No.1.
- > **1878**, The first steam pumper was purchased.
- January of 1882, a bell was purchased and served as the Charlotte's Fire Alarm until 1930. (This bell is now on display in front of the 111 E. Lawrence municipal building.)
- February 2nd 1886, A fire started at Belger's Shoes and 5 other buildings in the 100 blk. Of S. Cochran Ave. This fire is still considered the worst fire to hit the downtown district.
- ➤ June 16th 1886, A fire started on the west side of S. Cochran and claimed several buildings, the department required assistance from Battle Creek & Jackson. Pumpers were sent on a special train to assist in the fire fight.
- Fall of 1886, Charlotte completed the "water works" department.
- July 4th 1894, Fire broke out in the Eaton County Court House located in the heart of Downtown. The dome and bell collapsed, but the building was saved.



- October 1898, the first horses were acquired, Mink and Mack then served the department until 1913. In all five teams of horses served Charlotte Fire, unit 1918 when all were retired.
- November 6th 1901, The Phenix House (A hotel on the NE corner of Cochran/Lawrence) burned trapping people in rooms. No fatalities were reported and firefighters were credited for ladder rescues of 13 people.
- ➤ 1917, The Rural Fire Association was created to form the unique partnership with surrounding townships and the City of Charlotte. This expanded the departments rural firefighting ability and the relationship still stands today.



March 26th 1962, another downtown fire claimed the Cartwright Shoe store on South Cochran. Pumpers from Bellevue, Benton & Delta assisted. This fire drove the department to acquire its first ariel ladder truck in 1963.

These historic moments in the department's history are just some of the significant events that built the Charlotte Fire Department & Rural Fire Association



Message From Department

It is our pleasure as a department to present this annual report for calendar year 2022.

What a year, 2022 had many memorable moments within our department and the calls of service we provided to the community we serve. First, we would like to thank the members of the department, the leadership and dedication from our Captains and Lieutenants that keep things running smoothly, but the main appreciation goes to our volunteer members. Without them, it would be impossible to provide the cost effective, yet outstanding service this department provides as a whole. They truly are the back bone of this great department. We must also recognize the support we as a department receive throughout the year from the public, that support provides some of the best equipment a department can have.

In 2022, the department answered 1147 calls of service, setting a new record. Also, during the year, we set new records for 5 separate months. Of those calls approximately 50% were fire/rescue related & 50% were medical in nature, 283 (25%) of the calls overlapped one another, and we received aid 12 times from other departments and provided aid 45 times for fire related incidents. We responded to a wide range of emergencies, and are sad to report 3 fatalities and 2 injuries to civilians related to fire in our jurisdiction. We also reported 10 injuries to firefighters, all minor with minimal lost time. An estimated property value lost to fire was reported as \$2.5 million with saved value reported at just over \$96 million.

Two volunteer members retired from active service, Roy Gilbertson and Wade Nichols. Both are still involved with the department as VIP members. Five new volunteer members joined the department, 3 of them are currently attending the Eaton County Fire School. We attended two funeral service as a department, one for retired Captain Brian Stults and the other for retired volunteer firefighter Donny Wertz.

Department members participated in numerous fire prevention & fire extinguisher presentations, conducted fire safety inspections, attended/supported multiple community and school events, installed smoke and CO detectors for residents, logged thousands of training hours, delivered gifts to 415 children on Christmas Eve, and put on a bi-annual open house for the public in October, which despite the weather was a huge success. Volunteer members also designed/installed a memorial brick garden at the WSFS, this was accomplished through donations and hours of their own time and equipment. The department also placed several pieces of apparatus & equipment into service.

As we go into 2023, we will continue on, no matter what is thrown our direction. We will still be here, still answering the calls the same way this department always has. It takes a lot to do this job, and it takes even more to do it for basically no pay. The full-time firefighters understand that, and they could not do their jobs without the dedicated group of Volunteers.

We say thank you again, to everyone that supports this department and we look forward to 2023.

- Installed over 100 smoke detectors and CO alarms for residents
- New equipment placed into service including a LUCAS "CPR" device & 2 sets of Hurst Rescue Tools (Jaws of Life)
- Retired Fire Captain Wieting Donation of Ice Rescue Suit & Life Vest
- State of Michigan 1-million-dollar grant
- \$5,000 matching grant for new firefighter gear
- \$1,000 grant for new IPADS in all fire trucks
- Applied for SCBA (air pack) replacement grant
- Successful Charlotte Volunteer Firefighters Open House
- 2,548 Training hours completed
- Department Memorial Brick Garden installed at the WSFS
- Attended 2 former members funeral as a department
- Provided safety coverage and stand by at the Eaton County Fair
- Conducted 59 fire safety inspections, completed 72 Pre-Incident surveys
- Completed several plan reviews for new construction projects





Department Members

The Charlotte Fire Department is a combination department consisting of 6 paid officers, 1 fire dog and 27 volunteer firefighters. Full-time Captains and Lieutenants work out of two stations, with 2 on-duty 24/7/365. Volunteers respond when a call is received, and make up the work force of the department. Fire/rescue & medical services are provided to the City of Charlotte & Rural Fire Association (Townships of Eaton, Brookfield, Walton, Carmel & Chester), totaling coverage area is 147 square miles, or about 25% of Eaton County.





The Fire Department members participate in training throughout the year. The department holds a monthly meeting that includes training and an additional training meeting 6 months of the year. Multiple special events are also scheduled throughout the year for advanced training and when new equipment arrives.

Full time staff and volunteers also participate in state required EMS training to gain continuing education credits.

A long-standing Charlotte Tradition that is continued to this day.


In an archived Republican Tribune article dated January 5th 1956, dates the origin of the Christmas Kiddies program to 1906. Where members of the Charlotte Volunteer Fire Department delivered baskets of dolls, toys, mittens and treats to needing children on Christmas Eve. A merchant group raised funds, and the Fire Department "Santa's" made all the delivery's, first by horse-drawn wagons and sleighs and then by fire trucks since 1915. The Christmas Kiddies Program was adopted in total by the Charlotte Volunteer Fire Department in 1982. Assisted by hundreds of community volunteers, donations coming from across the United States, volunteer firefighters have been responsible for the fundraising, visitations, purchasing, packing, and delivering gifts to 400-500 children each year since.

Today the Christmas Kiddies' program has 4 routes dedicated to the City of Charlotte and 2 routes outside the city covering our entire fire district.







MOST/LEAST RUNS PER MONTH 1976 THRU 2022




